## EXCAVATION COINS AND A BYZANTINE WEIGHT FROM KÜÇÜKÇEKMECE LAKE BASIN

During the excavation seasons of 2010–12 at Küçükçekmece Lake Basin (10 km west of İstanbul), sixty coins (cat. nos. 1–65) and a Byzantine weight (cat. no. 66) were found.<sup>1</sup> Most of the coins date to the Byzantine and Ottoman periods; only ten coins date to the pre-Byzantine period, more specifically the Roman Imperial Period (mostly Late Roman, 4<sup>th</sup>–5<sup>th</sup> centuries).<sup>2</sup> Six coins were joined together and very corroded; it was impossible to make a clear identification of them, as no cleaning process has been carried out upon them. The only identifiable

coin was of Arcadius, a bronze coin (AE3) with a reverse type of Victory crowning Emperor (cat. no. 1).

Byzantine coins form the largest group (thirty two coins), among the coins found during the excavations. Twelve of them could only be partly identified due to their corroded condition, resulting in them being largely illegible. Byzantine coins range from Heraclius (610–641) to Anonymous Folles (10<sup>th</sup>–11<sup>th</sup> centuries). There are two coins of Crusader States; one of the Latin Rulers of

Constantinople from the first half of the 13<sup>th</sup> century (cat. no. 42) and the other of the Principality of Achaea (cat. no. 43) from the end of 13<sup>th</sup> century and very beginning of the 14<sup>th</sup> century. The ruler on the latter is Isabella of Villehardouin (1297–1301). She was the elder daughter of William II of Villehardouin, Prince of Achaia.

Of the twenty Ottoman coins, as a result of bad condition and not being cleaned, three could not be identified. The majority of the Ottoman coins date to the 19<sup>th</sup> century. Consequently, the coins found at Küçükçekmece Lake Basin excavations range from the 7<sup>th</sup> century to  $11^{th}/12^{th}$  century, including a few late Roman coins of  $4^{th}-5^{th}$  centuries AD. The Byzantine weight of bronze uncovered during the excavations (cat. no. 66) is a three-uncia weight with a depiction of façade on the obverse and can be dated to the 5<sup>th</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> centuries.

In 2011, during the survey research, five coins were found in the area (cat. nos. ITA 2011-INC11. ENV 01 through to 05). They are indicated in the catalogue by the word "survey" in parenthesis.

## WEIGHT

This is a Byzantine weight of bronze, square in form with triple-grooved profile; face stepped back from the edge; engraved on the obverse with a façade composed of a central rounded arch flanked by two triangular pediments resting on four columns supported by a plinth. Inside the façade (in middle) is a cross flanked by the denominational mark  $\Gamma o \Gamma$ (=three-uncia), all originally inlaid but inlay is now missing. Above and within the pediments, the inscription reads  $\Theta \in 8$  XAPIC (Grace of God). The columns are spiral in form and pediments are decorated by herring-bone motif. Depiction and inscription on the obverse is hardly visible and the reverse is blank. It is a three-uncia in denomination and may be dated to the Early Byzantine Period (5<sup>th</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> centuries).
